6. To be chosen from the college approved list.

7. No more than one Texas History course can be used to satisfy this requirement.

8. This second minor must be chosen from outside of the College of Liberal Arts.

9. Any 100-499 courses not used elsewhere.

10. The graduation requirements include 3 hours of international and cultural diversity courses and 3 hours of cultural discourse courses. A course satisfying a core category, a college/department requirement, or a free elective can be used to satisfy this requirement. The required 6 hours may be met by courses satisfying other areas of a degree program. See your academic advisor for further information.

11. The graduation requirements include at least 36 hours of upper level (300 and 400-level) coursework to be completed in residency at Texas A&M. 12 of the 36 hours must come from major coursework.

A grade of C or higher is required for a course to be counted in the major field.
